## **Other Families of Lee Creek**

Within the Lee Creek Valley was the Camedy, Squalls, Wakefield, and Nichols home places. Mr. Squalls ran a cedar mill. The cedar was cut from the many limestone glades in the surrounding area. The Wakefields and Nichols were intermarried and ran a large syrup mill. Mr. William Nichols was a revolutionary war soldier and is buried on Forest Service property in the mouth of Indian Tomb Hollow, east of the Alexander Motorway. The Nichols Cemetery is located on Forest Service property at the edge of the present day Dallas Yeager farm in Section 1 of township 8 South and Range 7 West.
